

Our Journey: Moving from "Why" to "What"

Even though it was Super Bowl Sunday, approximately 60 people attended the latest roundtable lunch on February 7. Each of us was asked to consider how our congregation should apportion our resources as we follow Jesus' teaching by sacrificially serving the people who are the most marginalized. Using the Ferguson Report as a starting point, we each assigned actual percentages to three areas of focus: systems and structures that promote justice, removing barriers that keep some people from thriving, and helping children and their families. There was heartfelt discussion at each table, followed by sharing with the full group.



The chart at right shows the results of each person's opinion as collected and averaged by Steve Staicoff.

As many people mentioned during the discussion, there is a lot of overlap among the categories, but our congregation does seem to have a desire to put more emphasis on youth and families. Good evidence is visible in the generous outpouring of support for our Nutrition On Weekends mission supporting 15 families at the Meacham Park Educare Preschool.

Please mark your calendar for the next Congregational Roundtable on Sunday, April 24. Using these results, we will try to decide how we can best use our finite resources to serve our community and the world. We will also discuss some structural issues regarding the transformational process we have been undergoing for the past two years, specifically regarding our congregational constitution.


