What is an Open & Affirming Church?

Several years ago, we conducted a long-term strategic planning process that included writing a mission statement, a values statement, and an identity statement. At that time we talked about what it meant to be a welcoming congregation, and in our identity statement we proclaimed that we were diverse in a number of respects – in other words, we were open.

We said that we did not deny access on the basis of, among other things, sexual orientation. Beyond that, however, we realize much more can be done to proactively include persons of all sexual orientations and gender identities in the life of our congregation – to be affirming.

As a way now to welcome people more intentionally and proactively, the Board of Webster Groves Christian Church has asked a team of members to explore the prospect of formally becoming an Open & Affirming congregation, as officially recognized within the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).

We would be among other Disciple of Christ churches in the area who have officially decided to become Open & Affirming congregations, including Compton Heights Christian Church, Memorial Blvd Christian Church and Community Christian Church.

A member of this team will soon be contacting you for the purpose of sharing what this means, describing the work of the project team and, most importantly, to hear your thoughts on the subject.

Meanwhile, we remember that God's welcome is extravagant and a witness to justice.

Lent marks a time of reflection

Lent is a season of 40 days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon word *lencten*, which means "spring." The 40 days represent the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry.

Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent was a time to prepare new converts for baptism. Today, Christians focus on their relationship with God, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of themselves for others.

Sundays in Lent are not counted in the 40 days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.


