The Disciples Women hosted a virtual General Meeting on Zoom on December 3. The meeting was well attended and enjoyed by all who participated. That was the kick-off for a wonderful month of giving.

Many of the DW became involved in writing Christmas cards to church members, made by Susan Moore. We worked on the Adopt a Family Program, some bought socks and underwear for the Head Start Program, while others chose to support our December Service Project by contributing over \$300 for the purchase of socks, underwear and sleepers for Head Start. After spending over \$200 on those items, the remainder was given to help the Neighbor Fund. Some members joined the congregation in purchasing food for the NOW families, placed a grocery item in a box and prayed for the families each day during Advent. Julie Wood gave of her time to make baskets for our shut-ins and, along with Tom, delivered the gifts including an Advent booklet before Christmas. We are thankful for Julie's contribution to our shut-ins. Janie Joplin finished the last three of seventeen quilts that are to be delivered to Nurses For Newborns from our DW Sewing Group. We are so thankful for the contribution that the sewing group makes to our missions. Several ladies joined the congregation project of baking cookies, selling dozens of cookies and enjoying a wide variety of cookies for their families. This was a project to raise money for Heifer International, which is a church-wide project each year. This December service giving is typical of our DW donations in December and is greatly appreciated by the organizations receiving it. A tremendous thank you for the generous support all of you gave to the 2020 service projects in a year that called for many ways to offer hope and faith.

A virtual meeting was also held by the Tabitha Group in December with several people attending. The Martha Group continued to send Devotional and study materials to each member by email or mail.

In January, the General Meeting will again be held on Zoom on January 7. Information containing the link will be sent soon to each member. The Tabitha Group will hold their meeting on January 21 on Zoom.

The Service Project for January will be a collection for the Neighbor Fund. This is a very important collection, because we are now replacing the funds used to complete our gifts to the Adopt a Family Program in December. Now we need to repay that fund, so money will be available to help people who contact the church for help. There is always a need for money in the Neighbor Fund. We thank each member who contributes each month to our service projects, which is above the regular offering to meet our budget. Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that.


Intelligence plus character - that is the goal of true education.

Practicing hospitality: an interfaith study

Join Interfaith Partnership in Spring 2021 for a 10week virtual course exploring practices of the world's religious traditions. The course will be organized around a central theme, namely that there are certain human "practices," and that these differ among the religions of the world. For instance, nearly all world religions are committed to hospitality, but how they practice hospitality can be very different. Or again, religions of the world have an understanding of "dving well," but how this most human of activities is practiced differs widely. Each class will focus on a "practice" and look at the practice from the perspective of differing religious communities. Classes will take a comparative approach, but not a comprehensive one; although every class will not be able to discuss every major religion, we will seek to include a breadth of examples over the course of the semester.

Rev. Dr. David Greenhaw, an ordained Christian minister, is the recently retired president of Eden Theological Seminary. Prof. Greenhaw began his teaching career at Vanderbilt University and has lectured on five continents. He is currently the Chair of the Cabinet of Interfaith Partnership.


